This competition brought together schools that finished third and fourth in their respective leagues from Mpumalanga, Gauteng, North West, and the Vaal region. The tournament took place from the 25th to the 27th of July at Hoerskool Linden.

Upon arrival, the boys faced the host school, Hoërskool Linden, in a thrilling match that ended in a 2-2 draw. Later that day, the boys played against Hoërskool Sasolburg.
