EQUESTRIANS MAKE SLC PROUD

Two SANESA qualifying rounds had to be cancelled earlier this year due to rain and flooded arenas. So, when the weather started forecasting rain again last weekend for the show at The Ranch, near Polokwane, all nerves were shot!

The excitement was palpable on Saturday morning at 05:00 when the Limpopo Chairperson reported the arenas were wet, but the show could continue! All day, the riders' and parents' eyes were turned to the clouds, but the rain held up! Koni Fobbe (Grade 12) and her horse, Saltash Dragonfly, and Ruben le Roux (Grade 11) with his two steeds, TI Quinta and Capital Clooney, flew SLC's flag high at the show!

On Saturday, Ruben and Capital Clooney were first into the arena, their first 130cm show jumping class ever!
