

For Ilne Kotzé her time in Australia is coming to an end, and she shares some parting thoughts about her experience down under.

"Unfortunately, my time in Tasmania has come to an end.

It's been an unforgettable experience, filled with countless moments I will always cherish.

Some of the highlights include watching the JackJumpers (Tasmania's basketball team) play, participating in the Foundation & Fundamentals Whitewater Skills/Rescue 1 course in New Norfolk, and completing my first dive after earning my open water qualification. I also had the chance to catch a few crayfish and oysters while exploring the beauty of Cataract Gorge. I was fortunate enough to fly to Sydney to see Coldplay live, which was absolutely amazing! While there, I visited the Sydney Harbour Bridge and the Opera House, then got up at 4:00 AM to fly back to Launceston and join a bushcraft and survival camp (even though I fainted on the second-to-last day). Walking around Dove Lake and soaking in the stunning views of the Cradle Mountains was another unforgettable memory, as was visiting Devils@Cradle. I also enjoyed playing golf with Fergus at the Bridport Golf Club, participating in STEAM week at school where we worked on launching a business, clay target shooting, and going to Mt. Borrow, which was absolutely stunning.

During my final week, we welcomed a group of Danish visitors, and it was fun getting used to yet another accent.

And of course, I'll never forget the unforgettable question I asked: "Is the river coming from Antarctica?" It's a moment I'm sure no one will let me live down, but it definitely adds to the charm of this whole experience.

One of the few challenges I faced was having to speak English 24/7, and hearing English still remained challenging, if not more so, at times.

This journey will stay with me forever, and I'll always look back on it with fond memories.

I'm incredibly grateful to my parents, my host family, SLC, SOC, the Round Square committee, Mr. Cordell, Miss Forrest, and especially Fergus—my amazing exchange partner. I couldn't have asked for a better experience."
