NEWS FROM THE CREASE

On Saturday, the 1st Cricket team traveled to Louis Trichardt for their second league match. Stanford won the toss and chose to bat first. They struggled early on, losing wickets quickly and finding themselves at 40-2 within the first 10 overs. Zayd Moosa then came to the crease and, together with Bodo Schulenburg, built a strong partnership of 135 runs, bringing the score to 173-3. Unfortunately, Zayd Moosa was dismissed after scoring an impressive 86 runs off just 52 balls.

There was a middle-order collapse, and Stanford ended up at 228-7. However, Connor Veldsman and Nakedi Makweya managed to add 41 more runs, with Connor scoring 26 runs off 32 balls. Stanford was eventually bowled out for 282 runs. Bodo Schulenburg made a valuable contribution with 46 runs off 79 balls, setting a solid foundation for the team.

Stanford's defence started well, with Connor Veldsman taking the first wicket, leaving the home team at 2-1 in the first over. A partnership began to develop, but Joshua Doolabh broke it, helping Stanford reduce the home team to 25-4 after 7 overs. Connor Veldsman had a great day with the ball, taking 2 wickets for just 11 runs in 6 overs. By the drinks break, the home team was at 75-6, and after the break, Zayd Moosa bowled brilliantly, taking 3 quick wickets. Louis Trichardt was bowled out for 78 runs, with Zayd Moosa finishing with 4 wickets for 15 runs in 3 overs. Matthew Allison also contributed with 2 wickets. Stanford won the game by 204 runs.



Girls' Cricket

On Friday the 16th of August 2024, the Stanfordian girls' cricket team played two matches, splitting into two teams to ensure all players who had attended practice were given an opportunity to experience the game. Despite their limited experience, the girls displayed tremendous spirit and the will to learn.

Match 1: Stanfordian Lake College vs. Nkowankowa Development Hub

After winning the toss, the Stanfordians elected to bat first. Facing a well-coordinated and aggressive bowling attack, the girls found it difficult to build momentum. With wickets falling at regular intervals, the Stanfordians managed to put up a total of just 33 runs.

Aware of the challenge ahead, the girls took to the field, determined to defend their modest score. However, despite their efforts, Nkowankowa managed to chase down the target in just 8 overs after losing only 4 wickets.

Match 2: Stanford Lake College vs. Giyani Hub

For the second match, the Stanfordians opted to bowl first. The Giyani Hub batters came out with an aggressive approach, piling on a total of 214 runs for the loss of 5 wickets in their 20 overs.

Chasing such a daunting target, the Stanfordians did the best they could, putting in a commendable effort with the bat. They battled through all 20 overs and scored 117 runs in reply. Despite falling short of the target, the girls demonstrated eagerness and the will to learn.

Both matches provided invaluable experience for the Stanfordian girls' cricket team. The opportunity to play in two competitive games will undoubtedly contribute to their development.


