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FINAL LEAGUE MATCHES VS. MERENSKY

The final league games of the season saw the Stanford Lake College girls' hockey teams face off against Merensky on Tuesday. The U/14 girls kicked off the day's action with a tightly contested first quarter, where both teams created equal opportunities but were unable to find the back of the net. The second quarter, however, saw Merensky capitalise on a defensive error to take the lead. Despite the Badgers' spirited efforts, they conceded two more goals in the third quarter. The final quarter mirrored the first, with both teams battling hard but unable to alter the score line. The match concluded with a 0 - 3 victory for Merensky.

The U/16 game held significant stakes, as the winner would secure a spot in the league playoffs. The Badgers, unfortunately, entered the match without several key players. Merensky seized an early advantage, scoring three minutes into the game from a well-executed penalty corner. The Badgers fought valiantly to keep the score line unchanged through the next two quarters. However, fatigue set in during the final minutes of the third quarter, leading to three quick goals from Merensky. The final quarter saw no further goals, resulting in a 4 - 0 win for Merensky.

The 1st Team Girls' match was highly anticipated, with Merensky needing a four-goal margin to qualify for the playoffs, while the Badgers sought to cap off their season with a league win. The game ended in a 2 - 1 defeat for SLC, but the team demonstrated exceptional skill and determination throughout the match.
