Community outreach and giving are two things very close to my heart. One of the most important tasks we have as educators is to teach our pupils the importance of giving and meaningful involvement in the uplifting of those less fortunate than ourselves. One of the questions I ask when interviewing prospective new pupils is if they could do one thing to make the world a better place what would they do? One of the most common answers offered is that they would help the homeless, feed the hungry and eradicate poverty and unemployment. Achieving these noble intentions would be difficult but through consistent small interventions, we can make a difference.

Over the past week, I have seen two sides to our community when it comes to giving. On Wednesday we held a blood drive. The response was overwhelming and our pupils and staff could not have reacted more positively. The employees from the blood bank were astounded at the response. Stanford's previous record number of pints donated was 17 units. The blood bank had hoped to collect 20 units, the Stanford community donated a total of 63 units. At one point SANBS had to call for reinforcements to be sent up from Tzaneen to cope with the volume. Many of the donors were first-time donors and my prayer is that this is the beginning of a lifelong habit of donating blood to save lives. One or two had uncomfortable experiences and understandably may not feel that this is for them, but they will make an informed decision having tried once. The blood bank has already asked for a date on which to return. Unfortunately, the next date which falls in rotation is in the middle of exams so we will look for a suitable date in the first term and aim for 70 units!

The second side I have seen is not as encouraging; our Outreach committee, driven by two senior pupils have initiated a project called "Boxes of Hope". They have initiated the project, designed the poster, marketed it to pupils and parents and created an excellent learning opportunity for themselves while trying to do good. The project is by no means compulsory and they had hoped to build 140 "Boxes of Hope" for the pupils of Appel (that would mean that just over half of our pupils would participate in the project). Half term was set as a deadline in the hope that pupils would use the time to put together the boxes and return them to school. The response has been very disappointing! We have gathered 29 boxes – a huge thank you to those who have so generously assisted the outreach committee. The aim here is that the pupils make an effort to get to the shops purchase the required items and bring them back to school. Our pupils take for granted the fact that they have easy access to all the items on the list, while pupils at Appel may struggle to get them. We will extend the date and I will once again speak to the school about one of our central values of Ubuntu and our need to be actively involved in our communities in the hope that we can achieve our goal of 140 "Boxes of Hope". **God Bless**

CRICKET

On Thursday, the 1st XI Boys Cricket Team played against Eric Louw. Stanford won the toss and chose to bowl first, which quickly proved to be a good decision.

Connor Veldsman took the first wicket in the third over, and he, along with Tristan Brett, put the visiting team under pressure. Within eight overs, Eric Louw was struggling at 13-8. The rest of the bowlers also contributed, with Matthew Allison and Joshua Doolabh each taking a wicket. The visiting team was eventually bowled out for 32 runs.

Connor Veldsman had an outstanding performance, taking 5 wickets for just 6 runs in his 4 overs, while Tristan Brett took 3 wickets for 11 runs in his 4 overs. Stanford's chase started strongly, with Dylan Turner and Ryno Schultz leading the team to victory without losing any wickets.



In the match against Eric Louw, Connor Veldsman took his 50th wicket for the Stanford first team. He is the first player since Thomas Mayes to reach this milestone.

Connor did this in 30 matches and 133 overs, which is 88 overs fewer than Thomas Mayes. What's impressive is that for every 12.77 runs he gives away, he takes a wicket, and his economy rate is less than 5 runs per over. This also includes three five-wicket hauls. Great job, Connor!



On the 14th of August, Stanford competed in their final league match against Curro Heuwelkruin. Our team displayed tremendous effort and dedication throughout the games. A standout moment was Aryan Ghelani's impressive performance in his singles match, where he secured a commanding 5 - 1 victory. GET TO KNOW OUR COACHES

This week we get to know more about Shane Friedrichs.

"I have been fortunate over the past 22 years to be involved in cricket in three top cricketing schools. My coaching career started at Cambridge High school in East London. In this time I was transitioning from a player to a coach. I always had a great passion for cricket but during this time I fell in love with coaching and gave back to the game that gave me so much. I moved onto Dale College Boys' where I ran the cricket programme for approximately 10 competitive teams which included high performance programmes for provincial and national players. During this time I was also appointed the Border U17 Head coach.

During my time at Stanford I lifted the profile of cricket exposing players to more game time and structured practices. As a school we have developed a solid coaching structure where individual players have wonderful facilities and access to coaches to succeed. I have also been fortunate to coach at provincial level while in Limpopo and have coached numerous age groups over the past 14 years.
