On Friday the 25th of October, our annual T20 Bash was held at Stanford. The Badgers fielded a young, inexperienced team. In the first game on Friday afternoon, Stanford played against Ben Vorster, who won the toss and chose to bowl. Ben Vorster scored 151 runs for 9 wickets in their 20 overs. Tadhg Egan was the top bowler, taking 3 wickets for 25 runs in his 4 overs, while Matthew Scriven and Dario Wasley each took two wickets. Stanford's run chase started slowly and stayed that way, finishing with 77-9 in their 20 overs. Ary-an Ghelani was the top scorer with 28 runs.

On a misty Saturday morning, Stanford faced a Merensky Invitational team. This time, Stanford won the toss and chose to bat, scoring 108 for 8 in challenging conditions, with valuable contributions from multiple batsmen. Stanford's bowlers started strong, with Dario Wasley and Tadhg Egan keeping the runs tight in the first 8 overs. The pressure continued, and Merensky was bowled out in 17 overs. Dario took 3 wickets for 16 runs, while Aryan Ghelani took 4 wickets for 16 runs, earning him the Player of the Match award. Stanford won by 44 runs. In their next game, Stanford played against a mixed U15 A and 2nd team from PHS. Stanford won the toss, chose to bat, and, after an early wicket, Aryan Ghelani and Bodo Schulenburg put on a 50-run partnership. Stanford ended with 112-5 in 20 overs, with Bodo scoring 40 runs off 48 balls, Aryan scoring 17, and Joshua Doolabh contributing an unbeaten 16. In their defense, Stanford took wickets regularly and restricted PHS to 102-8 in 20 overs. Joshua and Tadhg each took two wickets, while Aryan took 3 wickets for just 9 runs in his 4 overs, securing another Player of the Match award as Stanford won by 10 runs.

In the last game of the afternoon, Stanford played Tom Naude. Stanford batted first and was bowled out for 66, with Bodo scoring 20 runs and Joshua 22. Tom Naude chased down the target, winning by 10 wickets. Overall, it was a great weekend for Stanford's young team, and the boys should be proud of their achievements.

Stanford Lake College was also recognised as the top school in Limpopo.

BADGER OF THE WEEK

Aryan Ghelani had an impressive run of cricket performances over the weekend, earning him the "Man of the Match" title in two of his games. Across four matches, he showcased his skills with both bat and ball. On Friday, playing against Ben Vorster, Aryan scored a solid 28 runs off 51 balls and took 1 wicket for 30 runs in 3 overs. On Saturday, facing Merensky, he scored 8 runs off 15 balls and put up an impressive bowling performance with 4 wickets for just 16 runs in his 4 overs. Against PHS, Aryan continued his strong form, scoring 17 runs off 20 balls and claiming 3 wickets for only 9 runs in his 4-over spell. Finally, in the game against Tom Naude, he added 3 runs from 8 balls. Over the course of these matches, Aryan accumulated 56 runs from 94 balls, while his bowling yielded 8 wickets for 55 runs in 11 overs, giving him an average of 8.25 and a commendable economy rate of <u>5.00</u>.____
