Following a rather chaotic Monday morning, I set aside 30 minutes to remind myself why I do what I do. I decided to go back to one of my favourite TED talks. A talk by Ken Robinson presented in 2006. I have included the <u>link</u> and encourage you to find 20 minutes to watch it. (https://www.ted.com/talks/sir_ken_robinson_do_schools_kill_creativity)

In this presentation entitled "Do Schools Kill Creativity?" he speaks of creating an education system that "nurtures (rather than undermines) creativity". In his talk, he mentions the rapid rate of change in the working world and some of the skills that we think may be required to flourish in a modern world. That said technology is developing at such a rate that we have very little idea of what the skills requirements are going to be in 5 years let alone 50. In his mind, the key is not to stifle creativity but to embrace it and allow pupils to develop the skills learnt in the arts. He speaks of a hierarchy of subjects in schools across the world, with Maths and Science always being at the top and the Arts firmly anchored at the bottom of the hierarchy. The message from society to our children is: don't become a musician as you can't make a living! Or don't do art as you will make no money!

By stifling this passion for creativity we are doing ourselves and our children a disservice. At Stanford we preach a holistic education and

this week we have demonstrated this commitment by holding a culture week. We have held inter-house debating, singing and art, all small initiatives to highlight the importance of a love for the arts and creativity However, it is but a drop in the ocean, with a growing cultural programme which includes things such as junior art and dance in the Grade 8 and 9 timetable, clubs and societies, choir, debating, speakers and increasing our footprint at the local eisteddfods (with song, dance, music, choir and public speaking all included) we are making great progress.

Those able to attend last night's inter-house singing would have walked away with a sense of warmth in their souls, not necessarily because of the quality of the performances (don't get me wrong there was some extraordinary talent on display) but more for the atmosphere in the Dad Centre and the sense of uninhibited freedom and confidence that so many of our pupils displayed in their performances, despite this not usually being a comfortable space for them.
